No more forgetting to log in to shop or going to a store through a special portal. With CBM, the cash back savings come to you. By downloading the free shopping assistant tool, random surfs through popular search engines like Yahoo, Google and Bing can identify participating stores and the amount of cash back you can receive. The enabled toolbar will allow you to connect to the CBM site at your leisure while also keeping track of your cash back earnings. During the registration for the shopping



assistant, you will have the ability to choose when and how you would like to receive your cash back—directly deposited into your account, or a printed check, mailed to your address. By selecting which cash out amount you prefer during your account setup (\$15, \$25, \$50 or \$100), you will automatically be set up to receive your cash back without having to request it.

Summer trips impact youth for more than half a century

Over the past 56 years, more than 50,000 students have traveled to our nation's capital and experienced a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to see the foundation of our country. Electric cooperatives, like GreyStone Power, have invested both time and money into the leaders of tomorrow by offering them the chance to participate in the Washington Youth Tour (WYT).

Each year, high school juniors are recognized and recommended by their school counselors based on their exemplary academic achievements. Last spring, 43 students in the GreyStone service area accepted the challenge to test for a chance to become a WYT delegate and to travel to Washington, D.C., for a weeklong, all-expenses-paid trip, as well as the opportunity to rediscover themselves.

"This trip gave me a great chance to break out of my shell and explore the world," shares Charmi Patel, one of the five 2013 GreyStone Power delegates.

Delegates not only learn lessons in leadership, but also about the electric cooperative movement, American history and how their government works. These students are able to witness our country's history firsthand as they visit national landmarks, tour the nation's capital and museums, and even have a chance to talk to their local congressman.

"Our congressmen and senators know how to handle themselves in any situation. Through them, I have learned how to handle the tough questions, and that you don't need to please everyone. Simply state your opinion without worrying about political correctness or offending anyone," explains GreyStone delegate, Meaghan Shaughnessy.

In 1957, the vision of the WYT was begun by Sen. Lyndon Johnson. He expressed his desire at the NRECA Annual Meeting to "send youngsters to the national capital where they can actually see what the flag stands for

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and represents."

Since that time, it has become a primary goal of the WYT to help co-ops promote stonger communities and a stronger nation by giving as many young people as possible the ability to make meaningful, lifelong contributions to their communities.

This year, more than 1,600 students from 42 states attended. GreyStone delegates Stephanie Pierre, Meaghan Shaughnessy and Maenishia Simmons, of Douglas County High School; Charmi Patel, of Hiram High School; and Yee Aung, of Paulding County High School, were among the 106 students representing Georgia.

GreyStone has participated in the WYT program for 47 years. Each year, GreyStone representatives visit participating schools within the service area and present the program to the counselors and the students they have selected as school leaders. Students are given study materials, then are asked to test on that material at the GreyStone office.



"The highest scores win! It's a simple, but hard process. The students selected by their counselors are the 'cream of the crop' from their schools and because of the unique opportunity before them, we want to offer them a challenge. One that they know they have worked hard to earn," says GreyStone Public Relations and Communications Coordinator Ashley Kramer.

That sense of accomplishment can be seen on the winners' faces as their names are announced at a banquet in the students' honor. "The chosen delegates have an exciting road before them. The leadership potential they are about to experience and the knowledge they will gain on the WYT follow them throughout their future careers and truly will last them a lifetime," shares Kramer.

Take Action for Affordability

In September, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued new proposed rules limiting carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions of new coal and natural gas-based power plants, which could require the use of carbon capture and sequestration (CCS) or eliminate coal as a fuel source.

Co-ops oppose this rule and feel it should be withdrawn. Co-ops support using a diverse fuel mix, including renewables, natural gas, nuclear and coal to generate electricity, and using demand response and energy efficiency to use that energy wisely and keep costs affordable.

Electric utilities have researched technologies to reduce or capture CO₂ emissions from coal-based power plants for years, and have experimented with CCS technology specifically. This technology has only been tested in low-level projects, not on a commercial scale at a power plant. According to a 2012 Congressional Budget Office report, engineers estimate that CCS technology would increase the cost of producing electricity from

coal-based plants by 75 percent.

Americans concerned about making ends meet may not be able to pay for the significant increases in electric bills. The switch to an all-butone energy approach would limit Americans' access to a plentiful and affordable resource.



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


A day in history

It's hard to believe the majority of GreyStone's service area was powerless 75 years ago. Though lights from Atlanta could be seen in the distance, rural areas remained dark.

Member M. C. Austin of Douglasville shares the memory of when his town prepared to go electric shortly after the Rural Electrification Act passed in 1935. "At that time, we lived in Powder Springs where my dad, Emmett Henry Austin, had worked as a sharecropper for seven years. After giving half of what he made to someone else, he decided there had to be a better way of making a living," said Austin. "He borrowed money from my grandpa and took a short course in electricity. In the summer of 1936, he wired house after house in the country." At the age of 11, Austin helped his father wire homes with lines that would carry 110 volts. When the voltage capacity was upped to 220, Austin and his father visited the same houses and rewired them so the families could enjoy electric stoves instead of wood stoves.

CINNAMON CINNABON CAKE

Cake Ingredients:

5 tablespoons milk

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

3 cups plus 2 tablespoons flour, divided 1 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 4 teaspoons baking powder 1-1/2 cups milk 2 eggs 2 teaspoons vanilla extract 1/4 cup butter, melted 1 cup butter, softened 1 cup brown sugar 1-2 tablespoons cinnamon *Icing Ingredients:* 2 cups powdered sugar **Step 1:** For the cake, preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease two 8-inch cake pans, lining the bottom with parchment paper.

Step 2: In mixer, blend 3 cups flour, sugar, salt, baking powder, milk, eggs, vanilla and 1/4 cup melted butter. Divide batter evenly between two 8-inch cake pans, or into a greased 9"x13" baking pan.

Step 3: In another mixing bowl, beat 1 cup butter with brown sugar, 2 tablespoons flour and cinnamon. Continue to beat until fully blended and fluffy (about 3 minutes). Using 2 tablespoons, drop butter mixture onto cake batter. Use a knife to swirl.

Step 4: Bake cakes for about 25-30 minutes or until toothpick comes out nearly clean



from the center. Remove from oven and cool in pans for 10 minutes. Flip cakes out onto serving plates.

Step 5: For icing, whisk the powdered sugar with 5 tablespoons of milk and 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. Drizzle over warmed cake. Serve warm or at room temperature. Enjoy! Source: *ladywiththeredrocker.com*
